Pancho Castillo took a maiden flight with this new P-47 Thunderbolt 60-size ARF from Top Flite. It has a 63 in. wingspan and weighs about 9.5 lbs. He is running an E-flite 60 electric motor, 80 amp speed control, with 6 cell 5,000 mAh batteries.



Roger Cosio has designed and built his own creation out of miscellaneous parts and dubbed it "The Junk Yard Dog". He built the fuselage out of wall veneer and it is covered with Monokote. It has a wingspan of 48 in. and is powered by a Kraft 61 two-stroke glow engine with an 11 x 7 prop. A successful maiden flight was made.



Roy DeMille had a maiden flight with this new Cessna 182 Skylane from Fly Zone. The wingspan is 47.5 in. and he is running a brushless electric scale motor with 1800 mAh battery. Palomar RC Flyers, Incorporated By-Laws

May 2012

I. Name

The name of this organization shall be Palomar RC Flyers, Incorporated. The designation Palomar RC Flyers shall be considered synonymous with this name.

II. Purpose

This shall be a non-profit corporation for the purpose of social, educational and recreational activities pertaining to the building and flying of radio controlled model aircraft.

III. Membership

A. Membership shall be open to all persons interested in radio controlled aircraft. Members shall conduct themselves in a respectable and orderly fashion during all club activities. Any misconduct may be subject to action by the Board of Directors.

B. Any member in good standing may resign his/her membership by giving written notice to the club.

C. Members must meet the following qualifications:

1. All members must have full "open" membership in Academy of Model Aeronautics, hereafter referred to as AMA. If any member ceases to have the qualification necessary for membership in the AMA, his/her membership in the Club shall there by terminate, subject to reinstatement upon restoration of eligibility

2. Posses a valid FCC license if operating radio equipment on amateur frequencies (Ham).

3. Agree to read, understand and obey the flying site rules.

4. Pay applicable dues, fees and insurance, as outlined in the club membership application form. All such fees are established by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting at a regular monthly meeting.

5. The annual club membership dues of the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Board Members, Membership Chairman and Editor shall be waived.

6. The Board of Directors may recommend that the membership, by majority vote, confer Life Membership status on individuals who have made exceptional contributions to the club. Life members pay no dues.

7. A member participation incentive plan known as the "Palomar Dollar Program" will be in force. The program encourages member participation through implementation of a dues reduction plan whereby members can achieve a reduction of their yearly club dues. By investing their time per year doing something that benefits Palomar

RC Flyers, Inc., the plan will allow for a reduction of the yearly dues to a value determined by the board at the rate of \$10.00 per hour.

D. There is a ninety (90) day probation period for all new and reinstated members. Any member found in violation of the club By-Laws or Standing Rules may be subject to disciplinary actions or revocation of their membership in the Palomar RC Flyers, Inc. as directed by the Board of Directors.

IV. Officers and Duties

The following five officers shall be elected by the membership and shall conduct the business of the organization: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Membership Chairman. If Membership Chairman is combined with another office then one additional Board Member shall be elected.

A. The duties of each officer shall be as follows:

B.

1. President

The president shall conduct the meetings of the club and be responsible for the organization and conduct of all club business and activities. The president shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.

2. Vice President

The vice president shall assist the president, and act in place of the president in case of his/her absence.

3. Secretary

The secretary shall keep minutes of all club meetings (Board and General) and present these minutes for approval, record all motions and votes, maintain an accurate copy of the By-Laws and Flying Site Rules and keep all official documents and correspondence in order.

4. Treasurer

The treasurer shall prepare a monthly financial report to be presented at the regular monthly meeting and an annual financial report to be presented at the annual meeting. The treasurer shall receive and bank all monies collected, pay bills and disburse monies as required.

5. Membership Chairman

The membership chairman shall process applications for membership, keep a database of record, verify AMA membership and print membership cards.

V. Board of Directors and Duties

A. Board of Directors

B.

1 The eleven member Board of Directors shall consist of the five elected officers and six elected at-large members. The club president shall also be the chairman of the Board of Directors.

2 The duties and responsibilities of the Board of Directors shall be as follows:

a. Serve as the policy making body of the club.

b. Serve as the grievance and arbitration committee making decisions when/if problems arise. The Board may impose disciplinary actions including suspension or revocation/reinstatement of membership according to grievance procedure.

c. Secure a meeting place for monthly, annual and board meetings.

d. Secure flying sites and maintain them in good condition.

e. Appoint committees as required.

VI. Committees and Duties

A. The Board shall establish the following committees:

1. Safety Committee – shall be responsible for the maintenance of a safe flying environment. This committee shall consist of the Flight Instructors and Safety Officers. The chairman of the committee shall be appointed by the Club President.

2. Communications Committee – shall publish the monthly newsletter “Transmitter” and maintain the club web page. The chairman shall be the editor. The Editor shall publish the Transmitter monthly prior to the monthly meeting.

VII. Elections

A. Nominations for officers and board members shall be opened at the regular monthly meeting in September and closed at the regular monthly meeting in October. At least one nomination for each officer and six nominations for the board shall be submitted. Additional candidates may be nominated by the membership.

B. The Membership Chairman shall prepare a mail-in ballot to be received prior to the November meeting. The ballot shall list each position and the nominees and shall provide a place for write in candidates.

C. The election of officers and board members shall be held at the regular monthly meeting in November. The votes shall be counted and the results announced prior to the close of the meeting.

D. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected to each officer position and the six board candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected to the board.

E. In the event of a tie those members shall step out and a vote by show of hands shall determine the winner.

F. If a vacancy occurs it shall be temporarily filled by appointment by the board and a special election shall follow. Nominations shall be made by the membership at the first regular monthly meeting following the vacancy and the election held at the next following regular monthly meeting by members present.

VIII. Member Meetings

A. The regular monthly meeting shall be held on the third Thursday of the month, January through November at 7:15 PM. The annual meeting in December may be held on a different day as it is usually combined with a banquet.

B. Special meetings may be called by a majority vote of the board of directors.

C. The Board of Directors shall meet every month.

D. Regular monthly meetings shall generally follow the agenda:

Call to order – president.

Motion to waive reading of the minutes and accept minutes as published in the “Transmitter” – president.

Approval of the motion or reading of the minutes – secretary.

Financial report – treasurer.

Vote in new members – president.

Old business – president.

New business – president.

Guest speaker.

< Break >

Special interest group reports.

Tool of the month – president.

Model of the month and trophy – president.

< Adjourn >

IX. Regarding Money

1. The treasurer is authorized to pay on his/her signature without prior approval the following expenses:

a. Cost of the “Transmitter”. This includes software.

b. Cost of flying site sanitary facilities.

c. Cost of regular monthly meeting trophies.

d. Cost of annual meeting plaques and certificates.

e. Cost of flying site security.

f. Cost of regular monthly meeting, board meeting and annual meeting halls.

g. Cost of equipment maintenance up to \$1,000.00

2. Refreshments provided during the meeting break are paid for out of donations.

3. The annual 4th of July Club Picnic is paid for with club monies.

4. The Board of Directors is authorized to spend up to \$3,000.00 for capital expenditures (i.e. maintenance equipment, etc.). Any expenditure above \$3,000.00 requires club approval by a majority vote at a general meeting by those present and voting.

X. Miscellaneous Provisions

A. Ownership of all club assets shall be vested in Palomar RC Flyers, Inc.

B. Dissolution Of The Club

The duration of the club shall be perpetual. The club may be dissolved with the approval of the membership. Voting shall conform to that used for elections with the exception it must be a two thirds majority. Method of distribution of assets will be discussed and included on the ballot.

XI. Grievance Procedure (Flight and Safety Rules)

This section provides for enforcement of the Safety Rules that are related to flying activities or any other unacceptable behavior by an individual member or members.

Any individual may be expelled from membership from the Club by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the membership present and voting, if in the determination of the Board of Directors, such individual willfully commits any act or omission which is a violation of any of the terms of these Bylaws, or the Rules of the AMA, or which is detrimental to the club, the AMA, or to model aviation.

A two-thirds vote of the membership present and voting is required for reinstatement to the club.

A. The grievance procedure provides a mechanism to enforce existing safety rules by providing a progressive disciplinary system when needed. Although most complaints can be resolved informally, if a complaint is serious or cannot be resolved informally, the matter should be referred to the Board of Directors for its consideration by means of a Grievance Form to be filled out and turned in to the Board of Directors. At least one witness is required to sign the Grievance Form. The Board shall use its judgment in carrying out action on the following:

1. First Violation

a. Viewpoints of both complainants and accused will be considered.

Complainants name will be disclosed. If the Board so decides, a verbal reprimand will be given to the accused by the Board of Directors, and this will be recorded in the Club records.

2. Second Violation

a. Complainants name will be disclosed. The accused has the right to a written rebuttal, to be reviewed by the Board of Directors. If the Board so decides, the flying privileges of the accused will be suspended for thirty (30) days. Written notice of this shall be issued and a copy provided for the membership and published in the Club Newsletter.

3. Third Violation

a. The Board of Directors will notify the accused in writing and the Club members via the Club Newsletter that the club will vote on the expulsion of the accused at the next meeting. Said expulsion will last for a one-year minimum. A member may be expelled from the Club only upon two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the membership present at the meeting. The expelled member may reapply for membership after the expiration of the expulsion time period.

b. The three actions will not be enforced unless they are accumulated within a two year period of time.

XII. Any member receiving a Grievance, who directs any retaliation action against the person filing said grievance, will be subject to immediate expulsion from the Club. This is to include threats, intimidation, physical harm, intentional equipment damage, or any other action deemed retaliatory by the Board of Directors

XIII. Flying Site Rules

There shall be a set of Flying Site Rules which establish operating policies and flying site rules.

XIV. Amendments

The By-Laws and Flying Site Rules may be changed by amendment. The proposed amendment shall be presented at one regular monthly meeting and shall be published with the monthly newsletter and shall be voted upon at the next monthly meeting. The proposed amendment must be accepted by two-thirds of the members present and voting at said meeting.

Board Member Meeting Minutes, May 30, 2012.

Called to order:

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by the club President, Bill Hill.

Treasurer's Report:

Varley reported that the balance in the Club checking account is currently, \$28,233.77. This figure covers the months April and May. Dues income was 1,065. Expenditures for items such as sanitation, trash pickup, taxes and air events were 1,286.41.

Runway reseal:

The runway reseal project was discussed. David Drowns and Don Wadlington are in the process of acquiring three bids for the project. The first contractor, Hogue Asphalt Contracting, will be out at the field this Thursday morning to take measurements and prepare a bid. The other two companies, Weir Asphalt and All -Pro Contracting will be meeting with Don next week as well. The work should be completed by the end of June.

Noise control update:

Bill related a phone call he received from one of the residents across the freeway. Mr. Rich Dillon had been one of the people concerned about noise coming from our field in the past, and voiced his complaint to our club. He was calling to say that "the situation has improved". He wanted to thank Bill for the effort being made to address this issue. A "thank you" goes out to all members for working to reduce noise while flying.

Combat event:

There is a combat event scheduled for Sunday, June 10th. Bill and Ron Schuyler will be cooking lunch. Come on out.

Trash removal:

The Sheriff's Dept. has been notified about trash dumped at the front gate to our flying field. They will be returning Bill's call with an update on having it removed.

Young Adventurers at the field:

Bill is in contact Lynn Murphy of the Young Adventurers Club of Escondido. They are putting together a plan to host the Club members at our field in July. The tentative date is set for the 21st. The details are still being worked on.

HeliFreak Discussion:

Bill related his discussion with Kevin of HeliFreak with regard to golf cart rentals for the event. Kevin wants to provide golf cart shuttles for pilots. The problem is not with the four cart rentals, but rather with obtaining insurance to cover their use. It was suggested we substitute small pickup trucks for the carts. The golf cart issue, or a substitute plan, will be decided at some point in the future as planning progresses. The “tentative” layout for tent placement and parking at HeliFreak was discussed at length. It is expected we will have many more people attending this year over last; therefore the best use of available space is very important. It was suggested that we contact a mobile caterer to have a truck available for the weekend. This will be decided, along with other details, at some point nearer the event date.

More insurance issues discussed:

With the topic of insurance being talked about, the question of insurance for the Club tractor came up. Board Members thought it a good idea to check into insurance to cover the Club while the tractor is being used. After some discussion on the subject, it was decided that Bill will contact Tom Minegar to solicit his opinion on the issue.

Flying Site Rule 11D:

A discussion took place concerning Flying Site Rule 11D. The question at issue is whether a pilot should be allowed to accelerate through the taxi area then “lift off” at the painted white line or must start his acceleration AT the white line and “lift off” further west of said line. Varley pointed out that “some aircraft need more runway than starting at the white line would provide”. After a round table discussion, it was decided to table the topic and allow board members time to consider how best to approach this rule, how should it be written and what procedures will be safe.

June meeting:

Bill indicated that Frank Burke will be discussing his “model covering techniques” at the June Membership Meeting.

The Meeting was adjourned at 8:00 pm.

Report of two A/C lost at our field this month.

On the morning of one May, MX-2 50CC. Crashed apparently because NMHI Batteries installed were 2000 ma rated at 2C which would be good for 4 Amp burst. Servos installed in aileron position, Hi-speed, High Torque, Digital servos will draw 3 amps each under load causing total loss of control. LIFE batteries are rated @ 30 C and therefore will handle 60 amp burst a much better choice for his type installation.

On the morning of 17 May.

30CC MX-2 with Spectrum DX6 controlling, lost and momentarily regained control before final loss of all control. A/C smoothly descended under fail safe condition but was lost due to tree impact. Rx Battery was found to be fully charged one day later and ignition battery discharged. Rx switch faulty and found to be a single contact switch not appropriate for any except, perhaps a small electric. Manufacture appears to be Hao Yo. This switch looks very well built but its internals are not. Picture supplied.

These individuals include: all the flight instructors and many additional Club Members, who were on hand to help out. Thanks to all. The Cadets had a great time and were treated to demonstrations of 3-D flying and a show by the Combat pilots as well. Terrence Walker, CAP Cadet Squadron Leader, expressed his thanks to PRCF for hosting Squadron 714, and providing the opportunity for them to experience RC flying.

Noise issues:

Bill thanked all the "gas engine pilots" for their efforts to reduce noise levels at the field. Everyone's help is appreciated with this issue.

Runway resealing:

Aircraft “flyaway”:

John Cutler spoke to the Members to recount his recent airplane mishap. John had a radio failure due to a battery issue he was unaware of. John discovered the digital servos he was using required more amps than the nimh battery could supply. A change to ‘Life type’ batteries, which produce substantially more amperage, will prevent problems in the future. John recommends these to anyone using high torque digital servos in a large scale airplane.

Combat event:

A reminder, that the next combat event is scheduled for Sunday, June the 10th.

Club Document rewrite:

A motion was made and seconded “to waive the reading of the Club Documents in their entirety so that we might start to discuss the proposed changes“. Frank Burke showed his latest build to the members. Frank’s plane is a Yak 3 built from a RedStar kit. At 6 # 10oz. with a 55” wingspan, the OS ax 55 should fly it nicely. Covered in one of Frank’s beautiful Oracote finishes, it’s a beauty. The electric retracts add to the scale outline while in the air too.
