

One thing is for certain is that our guys did their best...sometimes things just go wrong! Certainly for team member Bill Hill it all went perfect as he now finds himself in overall 1st place! I encourage all of our club members to show up to the next Interclub Fun Fly event! and support your team!

I am still trying to get the car track tower removed from our site to obviate the need for demolition. Just taking down those two pavilions cost the club more than \$1000.00, which included \$500.00 for the material haul away and a bit more than \$500 for the Bobcat tractor. Needless to say I would like to avoid spending any more money on demolition at this point. 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INVITATIONAL FUN FLY

May 26th

This Fun Fly was held on May 26 - it was originally scheduled on May 24 but due to impending weather was re-scheduled to the Memorial Day holiday. It is the third in a series of Fun Fly events scheduled for this year involving 5 Clubs in the area - Palomar Flyers, Temecula Valley, Menifee Valley, Hemet, and Gilman Springs.

Four pilots from each club may enter each of two events. For this event, there were 16 pilots entered - some pilots represented more than 1 club - with 19 entries in all.

The events started with a timed event, in which the pilot was required to fly 3 Cuban eights followed by three rolls then land as quickly as possible on the runway. The event was timed from start to wheels down on the runway. Best time of the day was put in by Glen Kratz of the Temecula Valley Flyers in 41.8 seconds. Bill Hill, of Palomar Flyers, was right behind at 44.4 seconds.

The second event was a spot landing event in which a grid was marked out on the runway. The smallest 3 ft. section of the grid was worth 8 points with larger grid sections earning 4 points or 2 points (or zero if you missed the grid entirely). Pilots were given three chances to approach the grid and attempt to touch down their wheels. The touchdown point was scored by 4 judges. You were not allowed a go-around, so if no touch was made, it was also scored as a zero. The total of three touches was the pilot's total score.

The overall top score for both events went to Bill Hill, who finished with the top score of the day. Temecula Valley Club garnered the



most points.

A raffle was also held and the Menifee Valley Flyers brought the mobile barbeque. Angel Moreno and Tamara Moreno, from Menifee Valley, took care of all of these details as well as scoring the events. The Barbeque lunch was well received by everyone and the the flying went very well with only a few model casualties.

Two more Fun fly's in the series are scheduled - August 9 at Hemet and September 20 at Temecula. There is also a finals event to be held at Menifee Valley with the date yet to be announced.

Model of the Month in May was awarded to Frank Burke for his OV-10 Bronco. This was a kit from Hobby Hangar built in the Calif. Dept. of Forestry & Fire Protection design. They use it for fire observation, but it is also used by the military as well. It has a 57 in. wing span and is powered with twin engines OS-40FP with HiTec radio gear and Spring Air retracts. It is flying quite well and can actually land successfully on the runway.

NICKEL METAL HYDRIDE BATTERIES

THE EARLY PART of summer is always a great time to be at the field; the winds are finally starting to mellow, and the sun, although warm, hasn't really gotten excessively hot. It's probably the most comfortable time of the year for flying. But don't forget the sunscreen; ambient temperature has nothing to do with whether the sun is getting you or not, so be safe.

The old adage never too old to learn something new definitely fits with me. I'm always picking up new things, and many are very useful while some are pretty much necessary. For instance, lately I've been having battery issues.

With Nickel Cadmium being the predominant combination for power storage over the last 20 years, knowing how to handle and care for them was almost second nature. Confidence was high because we knew where we stood most of the time.

That hasn't been the case with the new nickel metal hydrides. They're a different animal in many respects and are what I would consider quite finicky. Though not as heat sensitive as Li-Polys, they are more difficult to "train" and put into some sort of routine.

NiMHs have a much stronger internal resistance than the old Ni-Cads, which can make them difficult to charge at times and they don't normally take well to fast field charging. The voltage will show good but there won't be much volume, and they will have a tendency to lose the power quickly sitting at idle.

I Didn't really find this out until a couple of months ago, hanging out in my shop with a good bud, Willis Lewis. I was complaining about the new batteries and explaining about the difficulties I

was having, and he said I needed to handle the initial charging much different than Ni-Cds. He explained the method he uses, and after a while it made a lot of sense.

Considering the new NiMH batteries are "eco friendly" the chemicals involved are much less reactive and therefore less effective. Much like everything else, the safer it is, the less it does! I used his method and the batteries finally started to do some work and were reacting in a more consistent manner.

The new batteries need to be cycled several times in the beginning and must be charged very slowly each time to get the volume necessary to do the job. There's not a specific number of cycles necessary, but after three or four complete cycles you'll finally start getting the capacity up where it's supposed to be. And it will hold.

AT first the capacity will show good fresh off the charger, but the next day they will drop off drastically just sitting at idle. It's very important that you know this fact so you don't waste time driving to the field thinking you are ready to go.

Another important lesson with the new cells is the difference in a bad cell. With Ni-CDs a bad cell will show instantly by not carrying voltage. A bad NiMH cell will hold voltage but will not be able to hold it's capacity. Fresh off the charger the cell will show good but will lose it very quickly, so keep an eye out.

Since batteries don't normally come with instructions, most of this is trial and error and learning from friends. If you're having troubles as I was with the new batteries, you might try this method. I'm finally starting to get some confidence in the new NiMHs, but it wasn't easy. Keep trying.

- Check Security - Engine, fuel tank, wheels, receiver, battery, servos.
- Pull Test - Linkages and control surfaces.
- Receiver Antenna - Fully extended and away from metal.
- Verify Center of gravity location.
- Conduct Range Test- with transmitter antenna collapsed.

PRE-FLIGHT(EACH FLIGHT)

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- Check transmitter power level.
- Check engine high speed, nose up.
- Check engine idle, nose down.
- Extend transmitter antenna.
- Check control surface direction and response.
