I cannot believe how fast this year is flying by! (OK, so it's a bad pun...)

By the time you read this newsletter we will have had our 4th of July club picnic and be well underway to hosting our 6th annual "Flights of Fancy" program in association with the San Diego Aerospace Museum. We will also be looking forward to the first electric scale show ever held at our club. June saw club participation in another Ramona air-fair, combat meet, car track races and several work parties.

The Ramona air-fair was very successful from the club's participation standpoint. We had over 50 aircraft on display and flew many different types of aircraft during our radically shortened flight times. It's too bad that the people in charge of the Ramona air-fair do not seem to understand that many of their spectators really enjoy watching our club members fly R/C model aircraft. I can tell you that I heard at least 20 spectators ask why the model aircraft were not flying Saturday morning.

We first got wind of a flight-scheduling problem about two weeks ago. I got a call from a "representative" of the local chapter


of the International Aerobatics Club (IAC). He told me they were going to seek to limit our flight time at the Ramona air-fair with or without our cooperation. Then I received a call from a Ramona air-fair "board member" who left me a message. His message stated he needed to discuss a change in our flight schedule. I turned the call over to Glenn Pohly. Glenn was assured that our flight times were intact, so he assented to the Ramona air-fair board's request that we fly Sunday as well as Saturday.

Well to make a long story short apparently, allegedly, the local IAC, in conjunction with the Ramona air-fair board, (and it appears the FAA), made some last minute changes which drastically cut our flight time in

favor of more full-size aircraft aerobatic flight time. I went to the FAA pilot's meeting, held at 8:30 a.m., where the FAA Air-show Coordinator announced the changes. He stated that "more time had been arranged for aircraft staging between aerobatic flights." I knew immediately were they "found" this "time", although I was told that "coastal fog" was the culprit to R/C's shortened flight time. It will be up to the

club to determine if we exhibit in Ramona next year!

I also want to thank Shane Selph for fabricating and welding the beam supports. These supports will be mounted to the top of the poles allowing us to secure the wood frame and complete the car track's sun shade.

By the time you read this article we will have already had the Club's 4th of July Picnic. Special thanks needs to be lauded upon Dave Truax for purchasing all the food. Hopefully the "burger flipper guy" we secured to cook the burgers managed to make it though the weekend! I hope you all had a wonderful time at this annual event.

The Car track has only one event scheduled for this month, excluding the 4th of July "free" race. Please see Gary's article for details. We did manage to find Gary some help and we shall see if this student program meets the club's needs. Hopefully, Gary will now have more time to fly and again be able to participate in the Combat events! (Gary, Butch told me he will be waiting up there for you, something about "fodder"?)

Speaking of Combat, I am glad to report that we had another very successful combat event, which saw the participation of a dozen pilots. The action remains fast and furious and exciting for all. This was an "Open B" and "Slow Survivable Combat" event the latter of which



The second afternoon session saw more of the same, except the Kadets were replaced by Curtis piloting Dennis's beautiful twin-engine Skymaster. At this round of combat, the crowd got what it came for. While I've heard at least four reasons (excuses?) for the ensuing crash, including one version where Butch claims to have chased the plane into the ground, the net result is George's Wonder wound up smashing at full throttle into the runway, scattering pieces across a fifty yard area. 
The crowd cheered.




We will need some east end cut-judges. It's an easy way to earn Palomar dollars.



Car Track Operations

For every race at the track, the track must be opened and prepared for the race. This is the task of the Track Operator, one of the track officials that helps officiate at the track for each race. For most of the races this year, we have not had enough volunteers to take care of this position, so in addition to running the races, I have been taking care of these duties as well.

At our Father's Day race, I found that the track had been converted to an Oval Track. So in addition to readying the track (see below) it was necessary to first convert the track back to an Off Road Track. Since all this takes extra time, I am asking all members that use the track to leave it as an Off Road Track when they leave for the day. Oval Racing has been suspended for the immediate future.

TRACK OPERATOR

The track Operator is responsible for preparation of the track area and maintenance of the required inventory of track equipment necessary to hold the scheduled races. This includes items like availability of water, electric power, gas for the generator, racing forms, etc. A partial inventory list must be maintained and checked at least monthly to determine that the necessary equipment is on-hand for the upcoming races.

On race days, the track operator should arrive at the track 1 hour before registration begins in order to make the track ready. The following checklist contains some of the steps to readying the track for a race.

OPEN THE TRACK

- Open the hydrant water valves to allow water to the track.
- Open the main water valve at the track.
- Unlock the Drivers stand.
- Remove 7 bolts and nuts from the Office window cover, open the

cover and secure.

- Remove 5 bolts and nuts from the Timing window cover, open the cover and secure.
- Open the Knack Box and remove the timing computers and monitors.
- Set up the Scoring Display monitor and computer.
- Set up the Timing Monitor and computer.
- Set up the Transponder charging rack and transponders.
- Set up and connect the timing loop decoder.
- Set up the laminator.
- Set up the compressor, if available.
- Set up and fill 2 tire-wash buckets at each end of the pit area.
- Get the turn-marshall cones out and set them in place on the track.
- Fill the primary and backup generator with gas.
- Get the primary generator from storage and place it in position and connect it to the power distribution panel.
- Get the extension cords from storage and layout power to the pit area.
- Provide power strips in the pit areas.
- Start the generator and turn on the circuit breakers at the power distribution panel. Check that power is available.

OPERATING THE TRACK

(during the race)

- Periodically check generators for needed gas.
- Respond to driver needs for electric power.
- Manage the handout and return of transponders for each race.
- Manage the signup and registration forms
- Check and resolve frequency conflicts.
- Use the Inventory List to take in-

ventory.

- Assist the timing operator when needed.

CLOSE THE TRACK

- Check with the timing operator to see that backups have been completed for race scoring.
- Turn off the generator(s)
- Place the generators back in storage. Note the full and empty gas cans and refill as needed.
- roll up the extension cords.
- Place the extension cords and power strips back in storage.
- Retrieve the turn marshal cones and store.
- Disconnect and store the compressor.
- Empty and rinse 2 tire-wash buckets at each end of the pit area.
- disconnect all track timing equipment, laminator.
- Place the computers and monitors and laminator in the Knack box and lock.
- store the transponders and decoder.
- lower the timing window cover and install 5 bolts and nuts.
- lower the office window cover and install 7 bolts and nuts.
- lock the drivers stand doors.
- Turn off the main water valve at the track.
- Turn off the water at the hydrant.




Scale Notes

BOEING P-26A "Pea shooter"

Emerging from the biplane era as one of the first all metal monoplane designs built by Boeing and accepted by the U.S. Army, the P-26A was a finalized version of three XP-936 Boeing prototypes built in 1931 and 1932. The P-26A was accepted for production on March 20, 1932. Its nickname of "pea shooter" was a natural from the tubular gun sight mounted above the fuselage directly in front of the pilots windshield.

Boeing built some 151 P-26A,s between 1932 and 1936. Eleven export versions were sold to China and were flown in combat during China's resistance to Japan's invasion. For its time it was the fastest air-cooled fighter in the world. Standard armament consisted of two .30 caliber, or one .30 cal. and one .50 caliber machine guns mounted in the fuselage. One at each side of the pilots feet.

The aircraft was equipped to drop two 122 lb bombs, or five 30 lb bombs from racks between the landing gear on the wing bottom surface. Powered by a reliable P & W R-1340 radial engine the other vital statistics are - wing span 27.9 feet, Length 23.6 feet, gross weight 3014 pounds. Currently, only two P-26 aircraft are known to exist. Fortunately for us, one of them is S/N 33-123 in flyable condition located at the Planes of Fame Air Museum in Chino California. This airframe was recovered from Guatemala and required extensive rebuilding and restoration. It is on display and can be photographed for building details. The final airframe is located in the Air Force Museum at Dayton, Ohio. The Air Force P-26 is painted in the olive drab and yellow trim of the 95th Attack Squadron of the 17th Pursuit Group, March Field, California.

Among aviation historians the P-26 is renowned for its colorful paint schemes. Various combinations of yellow, red, white, and blue were used for some of the most colorful aircraft of the period. As a modeler

you should love the available designs.


For a modeler, a 1/4 scale version would have an 84 " span. A 1/5 scale would run 67 inches or so. With a stubby 4.44 span to chord ratio, the 1/5 wing would have a 15" chord! That works out to a little under 900 sq. in. considering the rounded tips. At 30 oz/sq/ft the plane would weigh in at around 11.5 pounds.

Fixed gear in large spats would allow a working landing strut arrangement.

Later B versions had flaps to reduce landing speeds. These could be fitted.

A 1/4 scale set of plans is available from Scale Plans & Photo service, 3209 Madison Ave., Greensboro, NC 27403. Additional documentation photos of various color schemes and accurate 3-views are also available from the same source.
